1. T F The two primary radio operator positions in emergency communications are the Field Specialist (ZR2R) and ICC Specialist (ZR2F).
2. T F The responsibility of the ZR2R is to conduct primary or supplemental voice ICC radio communications.
3. T F One of the primary responsibilities of the ICC Specialist is net control station (NCS) functions.
4. T F An ICC may be located in a fixed location (building) or in a mobile (portable) facility.
5. T F Among the responsibilities within monitoring your assigned frequency, you should provide CART communications.
6. T F ICC radio operators should pass all messages in the order received.
7. T F An additional responsibility of the ICC Specialist is to maintain awareness of current threats and hazards (and mitigation or approved “work around” strategies).
8. T F SAL 1 notification will use standardized script and be conducted by the Radio Officer functioning as the NCS.
9. T F The first person reporting to the ICC should start a new Check-In List and a Unit / Activity Log.
10. T F The maintenance of the ICS-211 and ICS-214 is primarily the responsibility of the ICC Documentation Specialist (ZR2D), if mobilized.

12. T F The ICC Operational Briefing only needs to be conducted at the start of the incident.
13. T F Pre-planning and periodic drills will ensure that the ICC operating environment will be organized and stress free.
14. T F Assignments within the ICC should “fit” the individual being assigned to the position.
15. T F Field units will always be in safe and controlled situations.
16. T F It is not necessary for the ZR2R to notify the ZR25 that a “safety timer” has been started.
17. T F The ZR25 does not need to be notified of “immediate” or “priority” messages received by the ICC Specialist.
18. T F ICC Specialists must focus on their assigned position and not talk with other positions within the ICC.

19. T F ICC position assignments can be easily learned during one exposure / drill.
20. T F The ICC Specialist typically reports directly to the Field Communicator Unit Leader / Supervisor.
21. T F ZR2R position description and responsibilities are documented in the Position Task Book (PTB).
22. T F An ICC provides NCS functions to field units assigned to the incident and must be located within the EOC.
23. T F The #1 priority is to maintain safe operations at all times and to never jeopardize the safety of yourself, those around you, or the general public.
24. T F During ICC assignments, the NCS should remind field units as “air space” allows during transmissions to obtain confirmed acknowledgement from NCS of frequency or assignment changes.
25. T F ICC “support” positions should update SITSTAT boards within / around the ICC.
26. T F Personal hygiene is not a consideration when working in an ICC environment.
27. T F The document which aids in the setting up of the ICC (EOC) is the ICC (EOC) Checklist, ZR2-10AA-F.
28. T F All frequencies being used, including the purpose and tactical call signs, should be logged on the Communications Plan (ICS-205.ZR).
29. T F Arrival or departure of EOC officials or dignitaries do not need to be noted in the ICC logs.

30. T F ICC position assignments and resource requirements should be pre-established and not influenced by the incident needs and mission objectives.
31. T F Shift change updates must include SITSTAT briefings.
32. T F Handling radio traffic is the sole priority. Maintaining concurrent documentation is not important.
33. T F Voice radio positions must remain calm, cool, and composed during very hectic operations.
34. T F A field unit may request a “safety timer” from the ICC Specialist. After a specified period of time (10 minutes maximum), the ZR2R will contact the ZR2F to request status.
35. T F The ICC Documentation Specialist (if mobilized) must be notified of a “safety timer.”
36. T F “Immediate” or “priority” messages are immediately logged and processed by the ICC Documentation Specialist (if mobilized).
37. T F Documentation may be completed when there is a lull in the action or after the incident has been completed.
38. T F Maintaining composure is essential to keep operations “smooth” during all ICC assignments.
